Hometown musician continues to climb to top of percussion world

From Rome to Southern California and finally to Tacoma, Wash., hometown musician Donnie Bell has traveled from coast to coast as he continues to climb to the top of the percussion world.

While he still greatly enjoys tapping and pounding his drums, 26-year-old Bell, son of Donald Sr. and Rosemary Bell, would rather be first and fore-

most known as a composer.

Bell began playing drums at the young age of 10, and began performing with what would become a list of productions and performance groups. He is a 2004 graduate of Rome Free Academy.

For more than two years, Bell, worked out of Los Angeles where he attended the University of Southern California. He is now based out of Tacoma.

In 2010 Bell released Chronicles, a multi-movement programmatic piece scored for a percussion quintet. Toucan's Revenge, the fourth movement of Chronicles, has been performed by the Pierce College Percussion Ensemble and has received air time on Northwest Public Radio. As a followup to Chronicles, Bell veered in a rather different direction to write Hold On, Let Go, a solo work for piano.

In February 2011, Bell released what he considers his most elaborate work to date, Tacoma, WA. Tacoma, WA is a work written for a wind and brass ensemble and pays homage to one of his favorite places, his current hometown of the last

four years.

As recently as August, Bell released Snails To Slugs, a duet written for two marimbas. The follow-up to Snails To Slugs, Impaler, was released at the end of last month. Similar to Chronicles, the work features all percussion instruments. However, Bell claims that Impaler is much "darker" than most of his previous works.

Currently scheduled for a late 2012 release, Bell is in the midst of completing the sequel to

Chronicles.

Bell bases much of his work on the emotions of daily struggles, loneliness, longing and taking chances. Here is more on Bell and his accomplishments: Q: Who has been your greatest (musical) influ-
